Seed Grain Drill

A 7-foot seed grain drill is available to Harrison County landowners. To lease the grain drill, a lease agreement and refundable equipment deposit must be in the District office prior to use. Rental fee is \$5 per acre based on acre meter reading plus \$10 per day. Please contact the District office at 831-1647 for further details and to schedule use.

Recipe for Caramel Banana Pie

1 Can sweetened condensed milk

1 9-inch graham cracker crust

3 Bananas

12oz Cool whip

1 Heath candy bar, crushed

Pour condensed milk into an 8-inch glass pie plate.

Cover with foil and set into a shallow casserole dish filled with 1/4 inch water.

Bake at 425 for 1 hour 15 minutes (until thick)

Remove foil and set aside.

Slice bananas and set in bottom of graham cracker crust.

Spread caramelized milk over banana layer.

Cool for 30 minutes.

Spread cool whip over caramel layer.

Sprinkle with crushed candy bar.
